## City Council Member, Roy Stewart, Retires



Roy is a native Texan, born and raised in Fort Worth. Roy and his wife Joan settled in Grapevine in 1981. At the time, Roy was the owner of Roy Stewart Homes, Inc. He successfully operated his home building business in town for many years.

Since his arrival to Grapevine, Roy has had many roles in our community. He has served as Vice President of the Grapevine-Colleyville Independent School District (G.C.I.S.D.)

Board of Directors and President of the Grapevine Chamber of Commerce. He is an active member of Grapevine Rotary, AMBUCS and is a member of the Board of Directors for Northstar Bank of Texas. Roy was appointed Chairman of the 1994 Grapevine Bond Committee. He served as Chairman of the Board of Directors for Texas Bank and past President of the Baylor Regional Medical Center Board. Roy has numerous awards to his credit such as the D.E. Box Citizen of the Year Award, Rotarian of the Year and Distinguished Friend Award given by the G.C.I.S.D. Education Foundation.






## WEST NILE VIRUS PREVENTION

As the weather warms, it is time to think about mosquito season and West Nile Virus prevention. The City of Grapevine, in conjunction with its neighboring cities and Tarrant County, is once again working to prevent the spread of West Nile Virus by promoting public education, continually testing for the virus in mosquitoes, and actively monitoring areas of standing water. Spraying, if any, will only be done when recommended by the Tarrant County Health Department.

The summer is our dry season and the elimination of standing water sources that provide mosquito breeding habitat is important in the fight to prevent the spread of West Nile Virus. Swimming pool discharges, pools that are not maintained, over-watered lawns and potted plants as well as pet dishes are just a few of the many sources that provide breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

**Note:** The City of Grapevine has water restrictions in place, due to persistent drought conditions. Proper water conservation efforts at home will reduce mosquito habitat! Please follow water restrictions in place to ease the burden of the drought and reduce the mosquito-borne disease risk in our City. Additionally, be sure to drain your swimming pool to the sewer system and not the creeks and streams.



## POOL DRAINING

This is the time of year when many Grapevine pool owners drain their pools in order to refill them with fresh water. Our Environmental Services staff would like to remind residents that pools should be drained to the sanitary sewer system and not to the street where it enters the storm drain system. Pool water discharged to the storm drain system may contain chlorine, have a low pH due to high acid content and could contain high levels of algae (if the pool hasn't been maintained). It is also a potential problem when water that may not drain properly, stands in areas which may provide habitat for disease-carrying mosquitos. All of these situations can have a detrimental effect on the creeks, streams, ponds and lakes that the storm-drain system discharges to, as well as creating a potential human health hazard.

Most residential pools in the city are plumbed to the sanitary sewer, generally through the filter backwash system. This allows the pool pump to drain the pool to the sanitary sewer. A garden hose may also be used to siphon water from the pool into residence's sanitary sewer cleanout. Additionally, pool backwash systems should not be rinsed to the street. Backwash materials should be collected, dried and placed in the trash for disposal.

## CLEAN BRUSH AND REGULAR BULK PICK UP

The City began the Clean Brush Diversion program in March. As a reminder, the items are picked up on alternating Wednesdays and the breakdown is listed below. You may want to cut this box out and keep it displayed in a prominent place where you take out your trash and/or bulk brush items. If you have questions or need further clarification, feel free to call Environmental Services at 817.410.3333.

**1ST & 3RD Wednesday** – Clean brush & yard waste (place yard waste; i.e. grass clippings & leaves, in large "mulchable" bags or reusable yard waste containers). Large piles of tree limbs & brush need not be bagged or bundled. All clean brush collected on these days will be recycled.

**2ND, 4TH & 5TH Wednesday** – Normal brush & bulk items (which includes large piles of tree limbs and brush as well as bulky items, such as old furniture or appliances). Limbs & brush will not be recycled on these days.

In the 1970s, the celebration of "Historic Preservation Week" took off across Texas and the nation. Cities and states began to focus their attention on the importance of retaining local history and historic structures. In May 1976, the bi-centennial year, President Gerald R. Ford declared a National Historic Preservation Week and called upon government agencies at all levels, private individuals and organizations to mark this observance with appropriate ceremonies and activities. "We are a vigorous and mobile people, often oriented more toward the future than the past. It is important for us to preserve our physical heritage in the face of progress," said President Ford.

Grapevine was already on board. In 1973, the Grapevine Historical Society started the Fall Festival as a way to save Grapevine's historic Cotton Belt Railroad Depot and to start the Grapevine Historical Museum. At that event, Mayor William D. Tate drove a gold-painted railroad spike into a railroad tie using a gold-painted hammer to signify the start of something important. Speeches were given and the festival fun began. This small festival grew into Grapevine's Main Street Days festival. This year will mark the 30th Annual Main Street Days. Over the festival's history, Grapevine has proudly pointed to its May festival as one of the ways the town celebrates "Historic Preservation Week."

In 1984, Grapevine joined the Texas Main Street Program. In 1991, the Grapevine Heritage Foundation and the Grapevine Historic Preservation Commission were formed and Grapevine's Historic Preservation Ordinance was adopted, setting in place the framework for the protection of our historic buildings. In 2008, a fire sprinkler system was installed in the historic buildings on Main Street, a tangible testimony to the commitment of Grapevine's city leadership and building owners to preserving what cannot be replaced.

At the turn of the 20th century, brick mason Jake Waymire was rapidly making brick in his kiln near Main Street and business owners were waiting for him to craft enough bricks to upgrade their buildings. Today, the buildings we see downtown are the same ones that were built with Waymire's ca. 1900 handiwork. Worth preserving? Without a doubt! If you admire the downtown buildings and all of the city's historic structures that make Grapevine so unique, well, you might be a "historic preservationist," too! Come to Main Street Days in May and celebrate all that Grapevine has to offer in the historic downtown setting that is well preserved for future generations. Since the 1970s, every week in Grapevine is historic preservation week.

City of Grapevine is in Stage 1 of our Drought Contingency Plan. The Stage 1 drought measures include a twice per week limit on outdoor watering with sprinklers and irrigation systems. Residential watering is determined by the odd or even last number in your address.

**Monday** – NO WATERING ALLOWED


**Tuesday & Friday** – Non-residential sites (apartments, businesses, parks, common areas, HOA's).

**Wednesday & Saturday** – Residential addresses ending in 0,2,4,6,8

**Thursday & Sunday** – Residential addresses ending in 1,3,5,7,9

Irrigation or watering of any lawn or landscape is still prohibited between the hours of 10 am and 6 pm at all times throughout the year.
